

Probate Notes for November 28, 2016

Probate notes are a recommendation as to the outcome of the petition. Unlike tentative rulings, they do not automatically become adopted as the order of the court. Unless an appearance at the hearing is otherwise required by law, if petitioner submits a proposed order prior to the hearing and the recommendation is to grant the petition, no appearance is necessary. If you are scheduled to appear and there is no probate note issued in your case, you should appear as scheduled. If you wish to continue a matter, you must contact the civil division at (530) 406-6704, at least two (2) court days before your hearing.

Please note: The Yolo Superior Court is now located at 1000 Main Street, in Woodland. The following probate matters will be heard in **Department Eleven at 9:00 a.m.**

**CASE: Estate of Andradez
Case No. CV PB 16-184**

The Court notes the following deficiencies:

1. Paragraph 3(a) of the petition is blank.
2. Petitioner failed to file written bond waivers from each heir at law as alleged in paragraph 3(d) of the petition. (Prob. Code, § 8481.)
3. Proof of publication must be filed prior to the hearing. (Prob. Code, § 8120 et seq.)

**CASE: Estate of Chan
Case No. CV PB 16-177**

The Court notes the following deficiencies:

1. Petitioner fails to state the reasons why bond should not be required. (Petition, ¶¶ 2(d)(1), 3(d).)
2. Proof that the *Notice of Petition to Administer Estate* (Judicial Council of California Form DE-121) has been served on the required parties has not been filed with the Court. (Prob. Code, § 8110.)
3. The *Duties and Liabilities of Personal Representative* form must be filed with the Court (Judicial Council of California Form DE-147).
4. Proof of publication must be filed prior to the hearing. (Prob. Code, § 8120 et seq.)

**CASE: In the Matter of the Florence Kunitake Trust
Case No. CV P2 16-174**

On the Court's own motion, the matter is **CONTINUED** to Monday, December 12, 2016, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 11 so that the Court may more thoroughly consider the petition filed by Darrell Nishi.
